A BILL

2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Black History is Amer-
5 ican History Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 Congress finds the following:

8 (1) Whereas since before its founding, the
9 United States of America has benefited from and
10 been enhanced by the integral role African Ameri-
11 cans have played in our country’s history and con-
12 tributions to the world.

13 (2) Whereas African American history does not
14 begin in the Americas. It can be traced back to the
15 great empires of West Africa beginning in A.D. 790,
16 which aided the establishment and survival of colo-
17 nies in America and the New World, generally, and
18 fought against European oppression.

19 (3) Whereas African Americans have rep-
20 resented a significant portion of the American popu-
21 lation from nearly 20 percent at the signing of the
22 Declaration of Independence, almost all of whom, if
23 not all, were victims of the largest forced deporta-
24 tions in recorded history, the transatlantic slave

1 trade and resulting African diaspora. It is estimated
2 over 10,000,000 free Africans were enslaved between
3 the mid-fifteenth and nineteenth centuries during
4 the diaspora.

5 (4) Whereas slavery was not abolished and Afri-
6 can Americans not acknowledged as American citi-
7 zens until the mid-nineteenth century, servitude did
8 not abate their contributions to the settlement,
9 growth, and development of the United States,
10 which continued through Post-Reconstruction, Jim
11 Crow, industrialization, World Wars and conflicts,
12 innovation and inventiveness, constitutional
13 progress, and every aspect of American society.

14 (5) Whereas during the civil rights movement of
15 the 1950s and 1960s, civil rights leaders and activ-
16 ists championed the fight for equal rights, including
17 voting rights, for all African Americans.

18 (6) Whereas the seminal case of *Brown v.*
19 *Board of Education*, decided May 17, 1954, found
20 that the decades old policy of separate but equal ac-
21 cess to education was inherently unequal, and the
22 segregation of Black public-school students was no
23 longer the law of the land.

24 (7) Whereas African Americans continue to
25 fight discrimination, structural racism, economic in-

1 equities, and benign and overt omission of the inte-
2 gral role they played in our country's rise to great-
3 ness.

4 (8) Whereas currently, 12 States (Arkansas,
5 California, Colorado, Florida, Illinois, New Jersey,
6 New York, Michigan, Mississippi, Rhode Island,
7 South Carolina, and Texas) have passed educational
8 laws requiring Black history be incorporated into the
9 curricula of all public schools.

10 (9) Whereas Congress established the National
11 Museum of African American History and Culture
12 in 2003 after decades of efforts to promote and
13 highlight the contributions of African Americans,
14 which serves as an indication of the national impor-
15 tance of examining Black history. Since opening in
16 2016, the museum has worked to educate the public
17 on the American story through the lens of African
18 American history and culture and provide educators,
19 parents, caregivers, and students with tools and re-
20 sources on the African American experience, its na-
21 tional impact, race, racism, and the importance of
22 tolerance and inclusivity.

23 (10) Whereas according to a 2015 research
24 study conducted by the National Museum of African
25 American History and Culture and reported in Re-

1 search into the State of African American History
2 and Culture in K–12 Public Schools, key findings in-
3 dicated that teachers considered Black history as in-
4 influential in understanding the complexity of United
5 States history.

6 (11) Whereas the importance of Black history
7 is reflected in the National Assessment of Edu-
8 cational Progress United States History framework,
9 from pre-colonization through contemporary Amer-
10 ica.

11 (12) Whereas the Federal Government, through
12 support for educational activities of national muse-
13 ums established under Federal law, can assist teach-
14 ers in efforts to incorporate historically accurate in-
15 struction on the comprehensive history of African
16 Americans and students in their exploration of Black
17 history as an integral part of American history.

18 **SEC. 3. AMERICAN HISTORY AND CIVICS EDUCATION.**

19 (a) PROGRAM AUTHORIZED.—Section 2231(a) of the
20 Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20
21 U.S.C. 6661(a)) is amended—

22 (1) in the matter preceding paragraph (1), by
23 inserting “, which shall include Black history,” after
24 “American history”; and

25 (2) in paragraph (2)—

1 (A) by inserting “which shall include Black
2 history,” after “American history;” and

3 (B) by inserting “, which shall include
4 Black history” after “traditional American his-
5 tory”.

6 (b) PRESIDENTIAL AND CONGRESSIONAL ACADEMIES
7 FOR AMERICAN HISTORY AND CIVICS.—Section 2232 of
8 the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20
9 U.S.C. 6662) is amended—

10 (1) in subsection (a)—

11 (A) in paragraph (1), by inserting “, which
12 shall include Black history,” after “American
13 History”; and

14 (B) in paragraph (2), by inserting “, which
15 shall include Black history,” after “American
16 History”;

17 (2) in subsection (c)(1), by inserting “, which
18 shall include Black history,” after “American his-
19 tory”;

20 (3) in subsection (e)—

21 (A) in paragraph (1)—

22 (i) by inserting “, which shall include
23 Black history,” after “American history”;

24 (ii) in subparagraph (A)—

1 (I) by inserting “, which shall in-
2 clude Black history,” after “teachers
3 of American history”; and

4 (II) by inserting “, which shall
5 include Black history,” after “subjects
6 of American history”; and

7 (iii) in subparagraph (B), by inserting
8 “, which shall include Black history,” after
9 “American history”;

10 (B) in paragraph (2), by inserting “, which
11 shall include Black history,” after “American
12 history”; and

13 (C) in paragraph (4), by inserting “, and
14 with the Smithsonian Institution’s National
15 Museum of African American History and Cul-
16 ture initiative providing programs and resources
17 for educators and students” after “National
18 Parks”; and

19 (4) in subsection (f)—

20 (A) by inserting “, which shall include
21 Black history,” after “American history”;

22 (B) in subparagraph (A), by inserting “,
23 which shall include Black history,” after
24 “American history”; and

1 (C) in subparagraph (B), by inserting “,
2 which shall include Black history,” after
3 “American history”.

4 (c) NATIONAL ACTIVITIES.—Section 2233 of the Ele-
5 mentary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.
6 6663) is amended—

7 (1) in subsection (a), by inserting “which shall
8 include Black history,” after “American history,”;
9 and

10 (2) in subsection (b), by inserting “which shall
11 include Black history,” after “American history,”.

12 (d) NATIONAL ASSESSMENT OF EDUCATIONAL
13 PROGRESS.—Section 303(b)(2)(D) of the National As-
14 sessment of Educational Progress Authorization Act (20
15 U.S.C. 9622(b)(2)(D)) is amended by inserting “(which
16 shall include Black history)” after “history,”.
