Dear Secretary Ross and Director Dillingham:

We write to express our concerns with the U.S. Census Bureau's (the Bureau) recent decision to end 2020 Census enumeration on September 30, 2020, four weeks ahead of the date it previously indicated would be necessary to ensure the accuracy of the Census count. With four in 10 households yet to be counted, we urge you to identify how the Bureau plans to ensure an accurate count and reach tens of millions of the hardest-to-count Americans in just seven weeks.

On April 13, 2020, the Department of Commerce (the Department) and the Bureau jointly announced adjustments to 2020 Census operations, citing the challenges to counting the nation's population amid the COVID-19 pandemic.¹ The operational changes included extending the enumeration window for field data collection and self-response from August 15 to October 31. At the same time, you asked Congress to approve a four-month extension of the statutory deadlines to deliver final counts, to "ensure the completeness and accuracy of the 2020 Census."² In a statement issued on August 3, you backtracked, announcing the enumeration window would end on September 30.³ This last-minute change means the Bureau will conclude operations a full month earlier than expected, even as Congress continues to consider fulfilling your deadline extension request.

As of August 11, the national self-response rate was 63.4 percent, several points behind the final 2010 self-response rate of 66.5 percent.⁴ Significant additional self-response is unlikely at this late stage, meaning there are still roughly 60 million unresponsive households. Under the Bureau's previous plan, Census workers were set to follow-up with non-responsive households August 11 through October 31. However, concluding operations a month earlier means the Bureau will now have to do in seven weeks what would have been extremely difficult to accomplish in eleven.

By compressing an already tight schedule to conduct in-person outreach amid an unprecedented pandemic, the Bureau is threatening the integrity of the 2020 Census and laying the groundwork for what could be a historic undercount of the population. The roughly 40 percent of households yet to

be counted include a disproportionate share of people of color, immigrants, low-income people, and the homeless. Ensuring an accurate count of all people is critically important to the fair distribution of more than \$900 billion in federal funding and Congressional and state legislative representation. If the remaining Census operations do not achieve a complete count, historically marginalized and vulnerable populations most in need of federal investment and representation will get the short end of the stick for the next decade.

Our communities need a complete and accurate 2020 Census count. There are currently low response rate areas in every Congressional district across the country and we remain concerned about the potential long-term consequences of an inaccurate count for our diverse constituencies. For this reason, we request timely responses to the following:

1. Explain the rationale for the decision to shorten the data collection period and outline how and when the final decision was made.
2. Detail how the Bureau plans to conduct outreach to the remaining non-responsive households within the shortened timeframe, without sacrificing completeness or worker safety. Include information on whether the plan takes into consideration the unique needs of households that are historically hardest to count.
3. Outline whether an extension of the deadline would impact the Bureau's data collection operations, if Congress were to do so in the coming weeks.
4. Outline the Bureau's target national self-response rate and provide information on any plan in place to increase self-response rates within the shortened timeframe.
5. Explain whether the Bureau will be able to fully carry out non-response follow-ups before September 30, 2020 and, if so, how this will be accomplished. If not, provide details on the Bureau's plan to address any undercounting.
6. Provide information on any operational changes that will coincide with the shortened collection timeframe and whether the Department or the Bureau anticipate the changes will impact the number of attempts door knockers will make to gather in-person information.
7. Detail the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the recruitment, onboarding, and deployment of Census workers along with any efforts, guidance and policies the Bureau has put in place to protect workers' health and safety.
8. Explain whether the ongoing COVID-19 will impact non-response follow-ups, particularly in areas of the country with a rising number of confirmed cases. Provide information on the progress made so far on non-response follow-ups.
9. Provide clear details on how the Department and the Bureau plan to assess the accuracy of the final 2020 Census count.
